Pilgrim Placecards



Dress-up your Thanksgiving table with Pilgrim place cards.

Materials:

- Small Clay Pots
- Black Spray Paint
- Black Chalkboard Paint
- Yellow felt for buckle or yellow construction paper
- White Ribbon or even white paper strips would work
- Chalk to write names on when finished
- Craft Glue

Directions:

1. Spray paint your pots black.
2. Use your chalkboard paint and go over the top part with this paint (where ever you think you'll write the person's name). Follow directions on your chalkboard paint bottle, most require at least two coats and a wait time of 24 hours before you write on it.
3. While waiting for your paint to dry, cut out a square out of your yellow felt, and a smaller square in the middle.
4. Measure your ribbon length to go around your pot.
5. Glue on your ribbon and yellow buckle! I used hot glue, but I recommend craft glue, as my hot glue didn't work so well under the ribbon.
6. Write your names on the pot and now you have some cute place cards for your Thanksgiving dinner table!



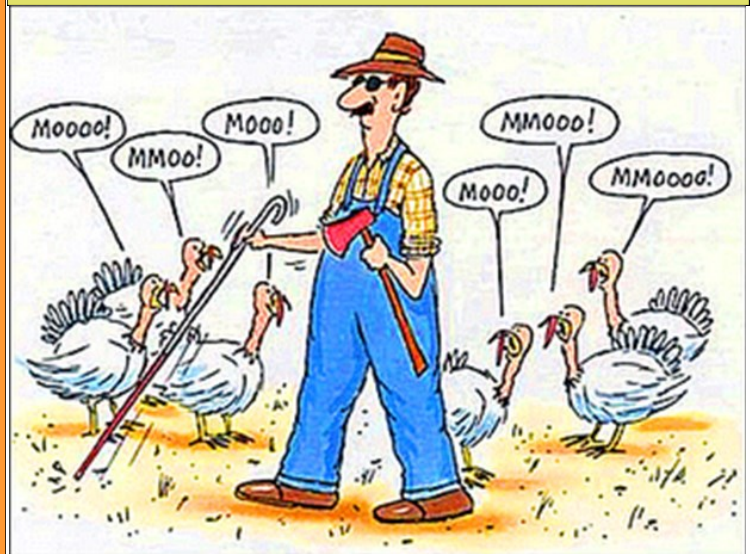
Turkey Cheese Ball Recipe:

- 1 8 oz. package cream cheese
- 1 cup shredded cheddar (I shredded a chunk of cheddar cheese)
- About 1/2 cup of chopped up mixed nuts
- 2 candy eyes (bought these at Stop and Shop)
- 1 Slim Jim
- pretzel sticks
- 1 round chocolate candy as in Whopper or Chocolate Pom poms for the head
- 1 candy corn
- a few teaspoons of melted chocolate melts to adhere the eyes and "beak".

Soften cream cheese and cheddar cheese. Cream the cream cheese and add in the shredded cheddar. I do this all my hand but if you have a food processor it would probably go faster. I stir and "cream" until both cheeses are thoroughly mixed together. Then I pop this mixture into a piece of plastic wrap and form it into a ball. At this point it goes into the refrigerator for a few hours to firm it up.

Take it out of the fridge and roll in chopped nuts being careful to keep the nice round shape.

Place pretzels as in picture to make the nice full tail of the turkey. A bit of chocolate melt to glue the round chocolate candy to about a 4 or 5 inch piece of Slim Jim. It was a bit tricky to get this to stay in place and eventually I placed it in the freezer in order to harden it up faster. I glued on the eyes and "beak" candy corn and placed in the freezer for a few minutes. After inserting the "neck" Slim Jim into the cheese ball, I placed the entire thing on a plate and into the refrigerator for overnight.

Word Search

You can imagine that Word Search puzzles have been around for centuries. Crosswords first appeared in 1890, and Scrabble was invented in 1938. But in fact the first Word Search puzzle didn't appear until 1968. It was created by Norman E. Gibat and published in a small classified-listings newspaper called the Selenby Digest in Norman, Oklahoma. Teachers in the area began to use the puzzles in their classroom and soon they being syndicated nationally. Word search puzzles are also known as word search, word find, word seek, word sleuth and mystery word.

The history of Sudoku dates back to an 18th Century Swiss mathematician's game called

"Latin Squares" (according to this article from the Economist) and some of the first number puzzles to appear in newspapers were published

In France in 1895. But the modern game of Sudoku as we recognize it today it today was invited by Howard Garns, a freelance puzzle inventor from Connersville, Indiana , USA in 1979 when it was published in Dell Pencils Puzzles and word game magazine. The puzzle was known as "number place", since it involved placing individual numbers into empty spots on a 9 x 9 grid.
